

# **Pronunciation of the German Alphabet**

- I. **The Alphabet:** See *German Alphabet* handout. The German alphabet also has four extra letters used in print: ä, ö, ü, ß

## II. **Vowels**

- a. **Umlauted Vowels:** The umlauted vowels are ä, ö, and ü

a	Nase
ä	Mädchen
o	Boden
ö	Schön
u	Stuhl
ü	Tür

- b. **The Letters I and Ü.** Round your lips for ü.

spielen	spülen
Fliege	Flügel

## III. **Consonants**

- a. **The Letters V & F** Like the English F.

Freitag vier fünf Februar Vorname

- b. **The Letter W** Like the English V.

Wann Schwarz wo Wort

- c. **The Letter R** Not like the American English R.

Rot reisen Freund Brief  
März Januar

- d. **The Letter Combinations of Kn, Pf, Ps** All letters are sounded in the pronunciation. They're not silent, like in English.

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“R” between 2 vowels: Gitarre Amerika Jahre

- e. **The Letter Combination of Ch** Softer sound is *ich*. Harsher sound is *ach*.

Ach = Aachen Nacht Noch Buch  
Ich = ich dich München Österreich

- f. **The Letter Combination of Sch** Like the English Sh in *shoot*, but with rounded lips.

Schön schon Schwester Schwarzwald  
Die Schweiz

- g. **The Letter Combination of Ck** Like the letter K in English & German.

Stück Rucksack Knackwurst

- IV. **Word Stress** German words are usually stressed on first syllable, with some exceptions, especially for words from Romance languages.

1. ie/ei = "When two vowels go walking, the **second** one does the talking"

Mai	= "my"	= May
die	= "dee"	= the
Frei	= "fry"	= free

2. "e" at end = extra syllable "ah"

Treue	= "TROY-ah"	= true
Fahne	= "FAHN-ah"	= flag

3. "d" at end = "t" sound

und	= "unt"	= and
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4. "st" at beginning = "sht" sound

staadten	= "SCHTAH-ten"	= states
steht	= "schtayt"	= stands

5. "j" = "y" sound

ja	= "yah"	= yes
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6. "aw" = "ow" sound

Frau	= "frow"	= Mrs.
Auf	= "owf"	= of, to
