B. Consonants – Many are softer than in English.

C. The Letter C: Hard when followed by A, O, or U:

canta	copa	cuna
Soft when followed by E or I:

D. The Letter Ch/Che: Similar to English: chico chao ocho

E. The Letter G: Like English

F. The Consonant H: Always silent except for when in CH

hora	hasta	hijo
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G. The Letter J: Pronounced like the English H

José	jueves	hoja
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H. The Letter Q: Always followed by UE or UI.

QUE sounds like "K"

QUI sounds like "KEY"

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I. The Letter R: Trilled only at the beginning of a word or if it's double RR in the middle of the word.

rojo ruso carro corral

Single R is pronounced with a single trill or a "flap" (it's like a soft D sound)

martes enero americano

J. The Letter V: Pronounced like B, but softer

verde viente jueves ave

K. The Letter Z: Pronounced like S

marzo tiza cabeza

L. Word Stress: Stressed on next-to-last syllable if it ends in vowel, N, or S

enero americano sombrero hablan estudian

Ends in other consonants, stressed on last syllable

corral papel borrador animal

Written accent marks move the stress to that syllable

adíos lápiz José matemáticas sábado
