* In 1994 the Real Academia Español decided that Ch and Ll should not be considered separate letters for alphabetization purposes. In pre-1994 dictionaries, Ch and Ll had their own sections.

* The letter Ñ is pronounced as the English “ny” or “ni” sound, as in the words *canyon* and *onion*.

* Since B & V are pronounced the same, sometimes B is referred to as “bay grande” (Big B) and V as “ube” or “bay chica” (Little V).
